# AGENDA ITEM 8.1 MANCHESTER AIRPORT CONSULTATION - REVIEW OF UK AIRSPACE

## 1 Report

- 1.1 Manchester Airport has communicated the following information to your Council.
- 1.2 In 2017 the Government published a policy on the future of UK airspace. This made it clear that modernisation is essential and also led to the industry's regulator, the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA), developing the Airspace Modernisation Strategy (CAP1711). The strategy reflects the fact that UK airspace is among the busiest in the world, having been designed for a different era. One of the foundations of this strategy is the need to respond to changes in technology and the improved navigational capabilities of current aircraft.
- 1.3 As part of this, the Government requires Manchester Airport to lead a process of changing the airspace around the airport, which relates to flight paths used by aircraft arriving at or departing from Manchester Airport and flying at heights of up to 7,000ft. The UK en-route air traffic control provider (NATS) is responsible for reviewing flight paths above 7,000ft.
- 1.4 There is a clear process set out by the CAA for the airport to follow and this will take more than two years.
- 1.5 Manchester Airport is embarking on the first phase of this process. The first phase within is called "Define" and requires Manchester Airport to agree the broad principles to adopt when designing new flight paths. This is not a formal consultation, but a requirement to develop a good understanding of the "principles" that matter most to the people and organisations affected by the airport's operations.
- 1.6 Manchester Airport has a long history of talking to and working with the communities around the airport, and the approach to this project will be no different.
- 1.7 During this stage, Manchester Airport is holding a series of focus groups, organised by independent research organisation YouGov. They involve a wide range of stakeholders from surrounding communities to ensure that there is a representative view on what matters to people ahead of designing the options for future flight paths. Focus group attendees are asked a series of questions to help gather their views on the "principles" that should be considered. There are 11 questions looking at a range of topics, such as whether it is better to concentrate flight paths over one area or spread them out more widely, and balancing noise and emissions.
- 1.8 Cllr Flannery has attended one such focus group. In addition, Cllr Dobson has recently attended an update briefing on the Airport in general and may also wish to comment.

- 1.9 The airport states that it is also important that anyone who is interested or has a view can join the conversation, and therefore there is a document outlining the approach and asking people questions about what should be considered at this stage. - 1.10 The document also includes further background and a series of FAQs, which may be useful if there are further questions. The questionnaire is open until 6th October 2019.
- 1.11 It is important to note that at the moment there are no specific proposals for how airspace around Manchester could change. It is therefore imperative that those affected by the airport's operations submit their views on the "principles" to consider when modernising the routes. This will result in a set of "Design Principles" that will be taken forward into developing a set of options during 2020 ahead of a full consultation.
